

I saw first-hand how economic analysis can contribute to policy and impact the lives of people. Knowing that I can make an impact through the work that I do means a lot to me.



I started working in the civil service in 2018 and worked in the Central Expenditure Management and Evaluation Unit in the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform (DPER).





In this role, I got the opportunity to work on 3 Budgets and 3 Spending Reviews. I was also able to deliver 2 research papers that have contributed to policy discussions.



The public sector is so big, and you have the opportunity to move around and learn new things. In my time with the civil service, I have developed many new skills. In secondary school I was so shy and hated presentations, now I do it in my sleep.



I would say to my younger self, stop stressing and worrying, everything works out in the end. I would tell her to enjoy university life and take part in the various clubs and societies. I would also say to her to not be afraid of making mistakes, because that is the best way to learn.
